### The boring (but necessary) legal bit

- All images have copyright attached even if there is no © symbol
- Just because the image is easy to find and copy, don't assume it can be used
- Always look for a copyright / permission statement
- As with the written word, you must always acknowledge your source, give credit, attribute
- There have been cases where people have had legal proceedings against them for illegally using images – don't let that be you!

### The Good News!

- There are lots of ways to get hold of free, good quality, copyright cleared images
- OneSearch, via Library databases by type
  - Contains resources that we purchase, together with the licence, for educational use
- Creative Commons
  - A non-profit organisation that enables the sharing and use of creativity and knowledge through free legal tools
- Free collections via the Internet
  - But be careful...

### OneSearch

- The University purchases a number of image databases
- Can be used for educational purposes
  - for written work
  - for presentations
- As long as you don't make any money
- Or place on the Internet




# Obtaining copyright cleared images from the Internet:

### Creative Commons Explained


- Individuals can assign a Creative Commons licence to their own work.
- Includes text and images.
- Gives various levels of protection.
- Let's do a search for 'Libraries' on Flickr to demonstrate...

### Flickr.com

- Searching for 'Libraries' produces a vast amount of results.
- However some cannot be used due to copyright restrictions.
- So for example, if you were to click on the central image within Flickr you will see the copyright symbol and the phrase "all rights reserved"



# However, you can change the results so that only those with Creative Commons Licence are shown.





# Individual image rights

 Still do not assume you can use any of these images.


You must check the individual rights and permissions.

Click on the image for more information.







- This is the most liberal license (CC BY).
- You can use this image and even modify it.
- You can even use it commercially.
- The only requirement is that you give credit to the creator.




- Creative Commons (CC BY-SA).
- You can use and modify.
- Your modified work must be re-licenced in the same way.
- Can be used commercially.
- Must give credit to the original creator.




- Creative Commons (CC ND).
- You can use this but cannot modify it.
- Give credit to the creator.
- · License any modified work under identical terms.



- Creative Commons (CC BY-NC).
- Use and modify non-commercially.
- Modified image must also be non-commercial.
- Must credit the original creator.
- Modified image does not have to be licensed in the same way.



- Creative Commons (CC BY-NC-SA).
- Use and modify non-commercially.
- Must give credit to the original creator.
- Must re-license under the same terms.



- Creative Commons (CC BY-NC-ND).
- Most restrictive of all.
- Download and share with others.
- Must not modify or use commercially.
- Must give credit to the original creator.

- Not very sophisticated search system.
- Essential to attribute.

- Takes some of the effort out of searching the Internet.
- All images displayed have Creative Commons License BY SA (attribute, share alike).


- Free images shared by a community of creatives
- No need to attribute
- Images are released under the Pixabay licence



# Google Images

### https://images.google.co.uk/

- Include "Creative Commons" in your search term.
- But it is not fool proof.
- Often leads to third party images on other sites so need to search for copyright or creative commons statement.

- Free open online community.
- Creative Commons Licenses.
- Geographically located photographs of the British Isles.

- High resolution stock images.
- Free usage rights.
- Can be used and modified for creative works.





# Xpert Images by Nottingham University

- Copyright cleared images collected in one database.
- Come with copyright statement and attribution.
- Not very sophisticated search system.
- Many are on Flickr also but saves the hassle of checking copyright.
