

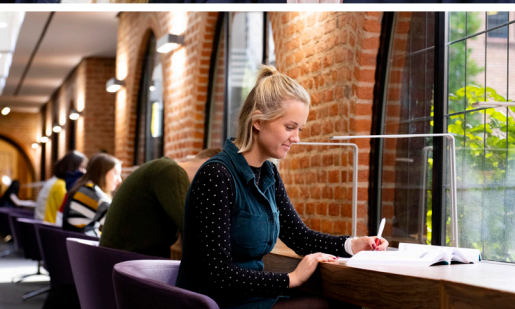

The Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS)

The Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS) is a national qualification awarded by the Bishops Conference of England and Wales, aimed at and strongly recommended to anyone who wants to teach in Catholic primary and secondary schools, as well as for parish catechesis. The qualification sets out to meet the formation needs of teachers, chaplains, catechists, youth workers, lay pastoral ministers and all who are interested in learning more about Catholic theology and faith in today's world. National recognition for the CCRS course comes from the Board of Religious Studies of the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales and from Catholic dioceses, schools and parishes across the country.

Why Study CCRS at Liverpool Hope University?

Studying for the Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS) at Liverpool Hope University offers a unique opportunity to deepen one's understanding of Catholic doctrine and practices within an institution celebrated for its high-quality teaching and leadership in higher education. Liverpool Hope University is recognised for its commitment to educational excellence, providing a supportive community where students can critically engage with theological and religious studies.

Liverpool Hope University is distinctive in that it is the only university foundation in Europe (and the USA) where Catholic and Anglican colleges have come together to form an integrated, ecumenical, Christian foundation. It has a rich history dating back to its foundations in 1844. The university was established from the merger of three teacher training colleges: S.Katharine's College (1844, Anglican), Notre Dame College (1856, Catholic) and Christ's College (1964, Catholic). This unique heritage underscores its mission to foster a community grounded in faith, scholarship, and service, promoting respect, social justice, and the pursuit of truth. The university's ecumenical roots are central to its identity, emphasising collaboration and unity among different Christian traditions while maintaining a commitment to academic excellence and holistic development.

The CCRS programme, highlighted in a report by Dr Ros Stuart-Buttle (a longstanding course director at Liverpool Hope) for its effectiveness in theological education, is especially beneficial for educators, catechists, and pastoral ministers. Esteemed academics, including Rev. Professor Peter McGrail,

whose research on religious education underscores the programme's academic rigor and relevance, lead the course. Additionally, Liverpool Hope's innovative online provision and growing learning resources ensure flexible and accessible study options, catering to diverse learning needs. Delivered entirely online and asynchronously, the course combines a great degree of flexibility with structure. While individual modules run to a timetable and have starting and closing dates, students can do their work at their own pace and convenience within the allocated timeframe. This comprehensive and inclusive approach not only enhances personal spiritual growth, but equips students with the pedagogical skills necessary to communicate the Catholic teaching effectively in various contexts.

Flexible Online Study

Liverpool Hope University offers the CCRS online, a study-route widely recognised as a high-quality, tutor-facilitated course, rich in Catholic theology and combined with a strong understanding of adult learning. It enables flexible study with multi-media learning resources and encourages participative, reflective and collaborative learning. Due to its flexibility and accessible learning, the course has a wide national outreach with a growing international presence.

Liverpool Hope University offers the CCRS for both full-time Hope registered students and for external candidates. The course is taught entirely online and in an asynchronous mode, using the university's virtual learning site (Moodle). There is no requirement for campus attendance. Media-rich learning resources invite independent study and reflection together with interactive activities for collaborative exchange among tutors and students.

Course Structure

The CCRS is delivered as a two-year rolling programme and requires completion of a total of eight modules: six core and two specialist modules. Four modules are offered each academic year and so it is possible to complete the course within two years or else take up to five years as allowed by the Board of Studies.

With the exception of the intensive summer modules, all modules run for approximately eight to ten weeks, and the online activities are best handled on a weekly basis mapping onto the weekly release of materials. There is no set time when students are required to be online, which allows students to manage their own study time accordingly.



Modules

The CCRS seeks to ensure that participants have a basic knowledge and understanding of the central beliefs and practices of the Catholic Church.

To gain the CCRS qualification, a total of eight modules must be achieved. This is made up of six core modules (Old Testament, New Testament, Person of Christ, Church, Sacraments and Morality) and two specialist modules (World Religions and Curriculum RE in a Catholic School).

The core modules explore key themes of contemporary Catholic theology while the specialist modules take a more practical focus and relate to pastoral work in the Church such as in a school, parish or workplace.

Each CCRS module requires a minimum of ten hours of independent course study time.

Successful completion of each module is evidenced firstly by regular online access and participation during the module and secondly through completion of an assignment that gains a passing standard by showing evidence of independent reflection, understanding and application of the module content, as well as wider reading.

Cost

For external students, each CCRS module currently costs £100. For Liverpool Hope registered students, the cost is £75 per module. In addition, for all students, there is a £25 Board of Studies registration fee.

Rev. Professor Peter McGrail

Dr Yazid Said is a Senior Lecturer in Islam at Liverpool Hope University. He is an honorary Canon theologian at Liverpool Cathedral and also an honorary assistant priest at Liverpool Parish Church of Our Lady and St Nicholas. He studied Classical Arabic and English Literature at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, and Christian theology

at the University of Cambridge. After being ordained an Anglican priest, he completed his PhD at the University of Cambridge on the medieval Muslim theologian Abu Hamid al-Ghazali (d. 1111). Subsequently he held a post-doctoral fellowship at McGill University in Canada and the Woods-Gumple fellowship at the Tantur Ecumenical Institute in Jerusalem.

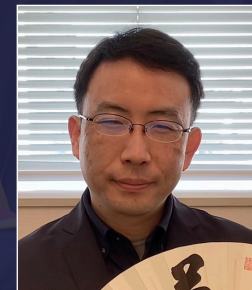
