| Programme: | UNHCR |
| Objective: | <p>Objective</p> <p>The Refugee-led Innovation Fund aims to empower displaced and stateless individuals by championing their creativity and ensuring their active involvement in shaping humanitarian efforts.</p> |
| Eligible Activities: | <p>By providing financial resources, mentoring, and expertise directly to refugee-led organizations, the fund seeks to enable innovative solutions that address the needs of their communities effectively. Through this support, the fund endeavours to reshape the landscape of humanitarian work, fostering inclusive participation and lasting positive impact.</p> <p>Actions can take place worldwide.</p> |
| Eligible Applicants: | <p>The fund welcomes applications from organizations led by individuals with lived experience of forced displacement, including refugees, asylum-seekers, internally displaced persons, returnees, and stateless individuals recognized within their communities. Applicants can apply as a team, usually as part of an existing organization, and both registered and unregistered entities are eligible. Special consideration is given to organizations led by underrepresented groups such as LGBTIQ+ persons, women, people with disabilities, Indigenous populations, and others.</p> |

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| Call Title: | EURES Targeted Mobility Scheme (TMS) |
| Programme: | European Commission (EC) |
| Objective: | <p>Scope</p> <p>The EURES Targeted Mobility Scheme (TMS) constitutes a European-level labour market measure designed to address labour shortages and hard-to-fill vacancies. It combines tailor-made recruitment, matching, training, and placement services with financial incentives. Support measures may vary based on labour market needs and their analysis. They should include provisions for interviews in another EU/EEA country, relocation, linguistic training, recognition of qualifications, as well as recruitment support. The end beneficiaries may include job changers, job/traineeship/apprenticeship seekers, and recruiting businesses, including SMEs, who may receive direct financial support through targeted allowances. The activities will encompass the provision of direct services to jobseekers and employers, including:</p> <p>information, matching, recruitment and placement; This may include innovative approaches and matching/recruitment methods to identify and reach individuals with particular skills, qualifications or profiles in line with the needs of specific labour sectors affected by labour shortages, in identified area.</p> |

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| Call Title: | Bridging Opportunities: Empowerment for Young Roma through English Language and Soft Skills Training in the Czech Republic |
| Programme: | U.S. Embassy in Czech Republic |
| Objective: | <p>The U.S. Embassy in Prague Public Diplomacy Section (PDS) of the U.S. Department of State is pleased to announce an opportunity for not-for-profit organizations/non-governmental organizations (NGOs) or academic institutions to submit project proposals to carry out a program of empowering young Roma individuals in the Czech Republic through the development and implementation of a comprehensive English language training program, complemented by soft skills training tailored specifically for this demographic.</p> <p>The overarching goal of this program is to address the critical need for enhanced English language proficiency and the cultivation of essential soft skills among the Roma youth population. This program aims to create pathways for improved access to education, expanded employment opportunities, increased social integration for Roma youth across the Czech Republic, and greater capacity to participate in international exchanges and collaborate with international NGOs.</p> |

Through experiential learning activities, role-playing scenarios, and real-world applications, participants should gain the necessary skills and confidence to navigate academic, professional, and social contexts effectively. Empowerment and Opportunities: Offer mentorship opportunities, networking, and access to resources aimed at holistic personal and professional development. This includes guidance on career pathways, educational opportunities, and strategies for overcoming societal barriers faced by Roma youth. Monitoring and Evaluation: Implement robust monitoring and evaluation mechanisms to track the progress and impact of the program. Regular assessments, feedback sessions, and qualitative analysis will ensure continuous improvement and accountability throughout program implementation. 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| | <p>completion rates, and how progress on skills will be measured, including whether participants will receive any kind of certification for completing the program.</p> <p>The program targets young Roma individuals aged 15-25 residing in the Czech Republic, with a particular emphasis on reaching those facing socio-economic barriers to education and employment opportunities. Competitive proposals will create program cohorts in more than one Czech city. Proposals should include information on which specific cities will be targeted for courses, how many students will be enrolled, and what age cohorts within the target will be included in the proposed programs.</p> <p>Priority Region Czech Republic, with particular emphasis on activities outside the capital of Prague.</p> |

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| Call Title: | CFAs: Supporting Consumer Education, Awareness Raising and Local Advice to Consumers |
| Programme: | European Commission (EC) |
| Objective: | <p>The European Commission (EC) is offering grants to protect, empower and assist consumers, in particular those who are the most vulnerable, by enhancing their skills, and knowledge, by providing local advice, by raising awareness of their rights, obligations, and choices in the market.</p> <p>This is a call for proposals for EU action grants in the field of consumer protection under the Consumer Pillar of the Single Market Programme (SMP Consumers).</p> <p>Under the key priority area ‘addressing specific needs of certain consumer groups’ of the Agenda, special attention is given to consumers that can be particularly vulnerable and need specific safeguards, for instance older people, children, people with low income, low educational level, people with disabilities, people with migration background or people living in remote areas.
